As we emerged from the pandemic and the health restrictions, some semblance of pre-COVID operations returned to our work. We came back to in person programs, and we were thrilled to see our members face to face again. Our CSI Summer Learning Program operated at almost full capacity. For the first time since 2019 we hosted our annual 100 Mile Dinner. At a few of our service locations we moved back to our original sites after using nearby rented space. Popular programs like organized sports and Power Up started back up again with eager members ready to join in. We saw the return of volunteers and practicum students who have always played a major role in our organization. It appears that we did turn the corner in 2022 and that we can get back to what we do best, working with children and youth.

2022 did not go by without challenges. We did not anticipate the labor shortages we are seeing in many sectors. Recruiting and hiring staff has not been an easy proposition. Programs could not start in some cases because of the lack of trained staff. Inflation has also hit us hard. Everything we buy from food, equipment, to gas for our vans cost more in 2022 than we had budgeted for. For the first time in over a decade we will show a financial deficit on our operations in 2022.

Since 1977 when we first invited children and youth to participate in our programs and services, we have had to be both adaptable and resilient. That might be more important now as we deal with the longer-term effects of living in a pandemic. There are issues coming out of 2022 that will be ongoing. For example, we are seeing more demand for what we do with limited resources. The well-being of our members and staff is an ongoing concern for BGC Winnipeg. Where will we find the dedicated staff that we need to carry on our mandate? These and more will be the challenges for 2023.

There is however lots to be optimistic about. In the latter part of 2022 as the number of children and youth coming back to in person programs our tracking showed that almost 60% were new participants. Thanks to the support that BGC Winnipeg enjoys we have maintained our long-held tradition of not charging any user fees for what we do. Events like our annual Jumpstart Day, Hot Sauce Dinner, Invitational Basketball Tournament and our Youth Recreation Activity Worker Training Program graduation ceremony will return in 2023. Our adaptability and resilience are paying off!

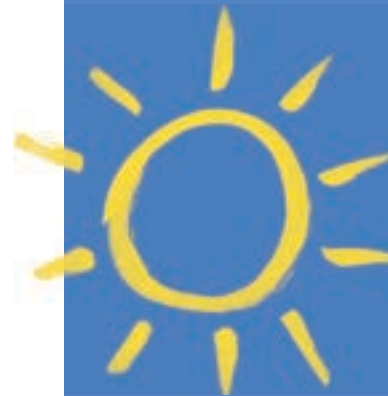

YEAR AT A GLANCE

Youth Council is comprised of youth from our Clubs who devote their time to philanthropy and giving back to their communities. The main component of this youth-led program involves learning about other non-profit agencies around the city, interviewing representatives, and deciding on grantmaking requests. By reaching out to and meeting with these agencies, members practice and develop professional correspondence as well as leadership and interviewing skills. With their final decisions, they can award up to \$2,500 to local organizations. In 2022, the youth provided grants to Fort Garry Women's Resource Centre, St. Raphael Wellness Centre, 1JustCity, and Klinik.

In Fall of 2022, BGC Winnipeg began offering **Raise the Grade** again, after a one-year hiatus. Raise the Grade aims to help youth ages 13-21 gain the skills and confidence to succeed in their school, work, and personal lives. Through hands-on learning opportunities, a specific focus on personal interests and goals, and supportive relationships with mentors and volunteers, youth in the program are supported to graduate from high school, gain insight into their personal interests and abilities, and explore career aspirations that match their personal goals. Programming ran out of our Victor Mager and Sister MacNamara Clubs, where teens have enjoyed activities such as learning to sew, designing their own sports games in small groups, and learning basic cooking techniques. Additionally, staff brought the two Clubs together for outings, so youth have an opportunity to meet new people and explore diverse interests. Some outings have included bowling and bonfires at Little Mountain Park to do goal setting and reflection.

Power Up! provides a supportive learning environment, where children and youth immerse themselves in engaging activities in an exploratory style in order to gain the skills, confidence, and motivation to become life-long learners. This year programming was offered at eight sites, including two non-Club sites, whose programming was interrupted because of COVID-19. At each site, kids participated in hands-on investigative activities, with a snack offered every day. Participants continued their involvement with themed-based learning, which bases learning around a theme that helps children make connections, transfer knowledge, and apply it to everyday life. Examples of themes we used this year include All About Fall, Sustainability, Black History Month, and Lost in Space.



44 Lead UP Youth Volunteers engaged in a total of 3,910 hours of service to better their community through acts of kindness. Some activities included organizing a beach day outing for children, securing a Rising Youth Grant and purchasing \$1,500 of much needed food for Harvest Manitoba, cheering on runners at CIBC Run for the Cure, visiting seniors in a personal care home, and organizing a pancake breakfast for children at a local Club.

One of the first in-person events for **VOICES: Manitoba's Youth in Care Network** in 2022 was our Pride Lunch. Youth in and from care were treated to a great meal and an even better conversation where everyone present was encouraged to be themselves. That sense of belonging is an important part of all of our activities for youth in and from care. Whether it's at a retreat, scholar's nite, a group home visit, or at the Voices Family Christmas Party, we want young people to know that they are not alone. We are here for you, and as alumni of care, we understand what you may be feeling. Voices is your Network.

Our Norquay Club had three of the **Winnipeg ICE** players come to play ball hockey with our members. The youth were very excited to meet real hockey players and to get to show off their moves. The ICE players were amazing, playing ball hockey with the youth for an hour and afterwards they signed shirts and took pictures with the kids. The youth chatted after about how cool the experience was and how excited they are to attend an ICE game with their signed shirts.



The **11- 12 Girls Basketball Team** has been the highlight of our Victor Mager Club. This team went from not knowing the fundamentals of basketball to beating the top teams in the league. All the girls have different skills that have helped contribute to the team's success such as being able to shoot three pointers and finish fast break layups. The girls basketball team should be very proud of all they've accomplished and how far they have come as a team!



Winnipeg ICE hosted the Medicine Hat Tigers on Sunday, April 10 with a 8-2 win for the ICE. BGC Winnipeg was the Game Day Charity alongside the Manitoba Underdogs rescue. The children, youth and BGC Winnipeg families had a blast cheering on the ICE, enjoying the temporary tattoos, balloons and bouncy castle, plus pancakes from Smitty's. BGC Winnipeg is grateful that 24/7 In Touch sponsored 100 tickets so kids could enjoy this special outing.



YEAR AT A GLANCE

This past summer, **Bridges Golf** gave us the opportunity to invite a handful of youth to try a new experience. The program catered to the development and introduction of golfing. Our lead for the program was very helpful, super friendly, and had (and still has) so much to teach the youth (including the supporting staff that would correct our form, teach the youth about the sizes of clubs, etc.). The youth began the program with little to zero knowledge about golfing and a damp interest in the sport. They learned a lot of the starter skills and knowledge, not to mention it improved the confidence of the individuals in our group.

ABC Program, led by Momenta, was held at a number of our Clubs once a week. Activities were aimed at building positive relationships with their peers as well as building emotional awareness and wellbeing. Eight participants enjoyed the activity based format, making it easier for them to engage and participate without it feeling like they are bettering themselves and their relationships. The Momenta leaders were very welcoming and accommodating, allowing people to share to their comfortability. We always started each day with an emotional check in to see how everyone is doing, as well as a reflection at the end of the day to connect the activities to their larger goals of self betterment.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Misty Evbogame – Eric & Carol Johnson Scholarship, \$32,000

Misty is currently enrolled at the University of Manitoba, completing her first-year prerequisite courses that she needs to apply to the University's Faculty of Nursing. So far, Misty's classes in Microbiology and Anatomy has reaffirmed her decision to become a nurse and she has met a lot of new friends who also intend to go into Nursing.

Justine Baxa – BGC Winnipeg Bursary, \$3,750

In the fall, Justine enrolled in her second year at the University of Winnipeg, where she took courses in Education and Biology.

Angel Aibangbee – BGC Winnipeg Bursary, \$3,750

Angel is currently enrolled at the University of Winnipeg, where she intends to study to become a veterinarian.

Hannah Olugbodi – Pay It Forward Bursary, \$3,000 and Friends of Winnipeg Youth, \$1,000

Hannah is doing her first year at the University of Manitoba, where she is enrolled in the Faculty of Kinesiology and Recreation Management. She is also a redshirt on the Bison's Women's Basketball Team.

Deborah Eddi – Pay It Forward Bursary, \$3,000 and Friends of Winnipeg Youth, \$1,000

Deborah is attending the University of Winnipeg, where she intends to eventually go into law school.

BGCC Scholarships – Youth Accelerator Scholarship

Last year, four BGC Winnipeg teens were the recipients of BGC Canada's Youth Accelerator Scholarship. This scholarship provides two years of employment with BGC Winnipeg while teens are still in High School and then four years of funding towards their post-secondary tuition, in addition to paid internship opportunities during their post-secondary studies. In 2022, these teens were employed with CSI, Clean Machine, and at BGCW's head office as part of their employment.



Over 70% of the youth hired for the summer **Clean Machine Streets and Waterways** program were employed for the first time. 95% were also members of BGC Winnipeg. The youth picked up over 240 bags of garbage from sidewalks and greenspaces throughout the city. Some of the projects we worked included maintaining and watering of gardens, cleaning up of trash/garbage in the green spaces throughout the city, weeding and pulling of thistle in the parks, spreading mulch to form pathways at some of the parks, and the fencing trees to prevent beaver damage near various waterways. Between the two programs we employed approximately 23 youth over the summer.

The **Youth Recreation Activity Worker** program which runs in partnership with RRC Polytech had another successful year in 2022 despite dealing with COVID restrictions. Due to COVID protocols still in place we had a virtual grad at the end of May. We had a total of 11 students graduating from the program in 2022. Most of the students found employment within the first month of graduating. Two of the graduates also continued with their studies in September 2022, entering the second year of the Child and Youth Care worker program at RRC Polytech.

The **Personalized Employment Program (PEP)** continued to operate virtually helping youth and young adults aged 16-28 find and maintain employment. The program offers individualized services as well as group work empowering clients with the tools and skills needed to successfully attain and maintain employment. Intakes were done on a continual basis throughout the year. Resume writing, interview preparation, job search skills and life skills were the most utilized services at PEP. In 2022 we had 57 clients come and access our services, and 31 secured employment, either full time or part time.

This Way ONward is a program that runs in partnership with the Old Navy stores. Youth ages 16-24 from our Clubs were recruited into the program which helps them build connections with the local Old Navy locations throughout Winnipeg and go through the process of possibly finding employment at their stores. The youth participated in pre-employment programming and then went through the process of job shadowing at one of the stores then had the opportunity to go through the interview process. In 2022 we had four youth go through this program and five of them found employment at one of the Old Navy stores.

Skilled4Success is a 10-week employment training program funded by the Youth Employment Skills Strategy (YESS) Program, designed to help youth overcome barriers to employment by developing a broad range of skills and knowledge. This paid program includes a quality work experience placement at one of our BGC Winnipeg Clubs. In 2022 we had 12 participants complete the program, which included training in areas such as: identifying goals and skills, career exploration, professionalism, mental health, and the world of work.

LEARNING AND IMPACT PROJECT SUMMARY

The purpose of this project is to help our Club and Clubs across Canada understand and improve our impact in the lives of the children and youth in our communities.

The project administered a survey designed to discover how children and youth who attend Club are developing in four key areas: positive relationships, healthy living, lifelong learning, and leadership. We will use the survey data to guide our learning and development as an organization, both locally and nationally, in the years to come.

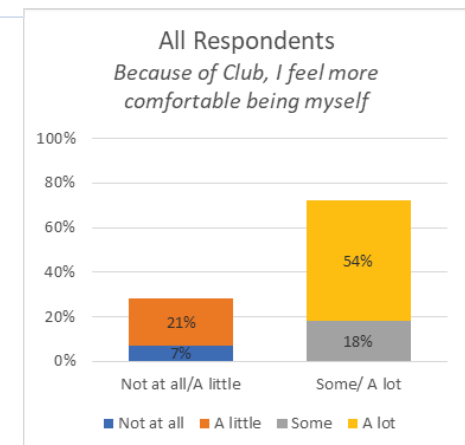
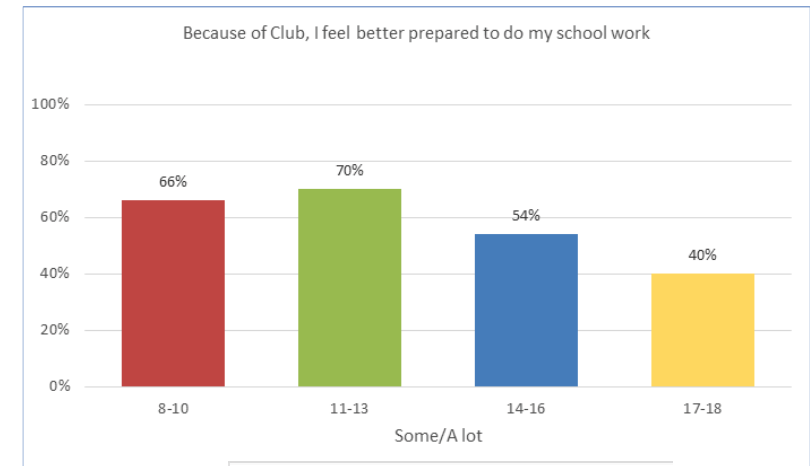
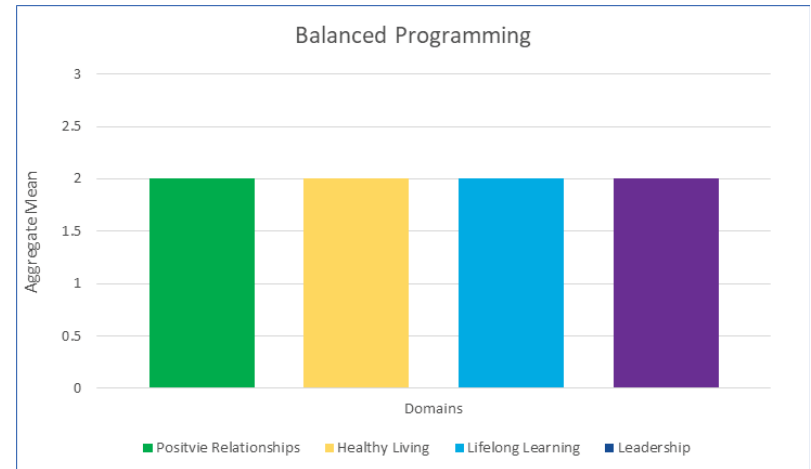
Our Club administered this survey to all children and youth aged 8 and older who were in attendance during the week(s) of February 21st to March 4th. We administered the survey in various ways, in Club using tablets/computers/smartphones; in Club by having children complete paper surveys and in virtual programming by using the virtual chat to provide a link to the survey to participating children and youth, etc. The total number of children ages 8-18 who attended Club programming during this time was 297. 208 surveys were completed, giving us a 70% response rate.

The data were analyzed primarily using measures of central tendency. We identified patterns within the full data corpus and then disaggregated the data by demographic factors including age, identification as indigenous, identification as a person of colour, and gender identity. From these patterns, we identified the most significant insights as findings from the data.

Some of our significant findings were that our Club has a balance response across domains indicating that our programs target positive relationships, healthy living, lifelong learning and leadership at similar rates. We also found that overwhelmingly children and youth feel like they can be themselves at Club. The data also revealed areas where we can improve. We noticed that our teens primarily did not see Club as a place where they can get support with school. This prompted us to seek out funding for homework and other school support programs like Raise the Grade.

Overall, children and youth at BGC Winnipeg are experiencing positive outcomes because of their time at the Club. Being physically active, having new experiences and developing leadership skills are some of the key areas that children and youth identify the Club positively impacting them.

The data also clearly show us that children and youth that struggle with knowing who they are or those who might identify as different in some ways have had less positive experiences because of the Club. Creating environments where youth can explore who they are more fully will be especially important in our steps forward.
